Vehicle release: every 14 days unless otherwise stated

Any claim for the property must be made by the claimant within 14 days of the date of seizure

The Authority may retain the property for the duration of an investigation or criminal proceedings

A seizure authority may seize and destroy property if it is necessary to prevent it from being used for the commission of an offence or to prevent it from being used in a way which is likely to cause damage to the environment or to the health or safety of the public

A copy of this notice has been served on the owner of the vehicle, the registered keeper and any other person who has been published in the seizure authority's records

VEHICLE RELEASE GUIDANCE - (To be included in the statutory notice)

1. If the seized property is a vehicle with a registration mark and you are claiming to be the registered keeper of the vehicle (the 'log book' / V5 document), you must produce the document.
2. The person claiming the vehicle must provide proof of name and one of address. Any claim for release of a vehicle seized in the list below will be required. You must provide another form of name and one of address if you cannot provide a utility bill.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Current signed passport • Original birth certificate (UK birth certificate issued within 12 months of the date of birth) • Full form including authorities covering as follows: • EA member state identity card (which can also be used as evidence of address if it carries this) • UK or EEA photograph driving licence • Full old-style driving licence • Photographic registration cards for self-employed individuals in the construction industry - CIS 4 • Benefit book or form Benefits Agency • Firearms or shooting certificate • Residence permit issued by the Home Office • International passport bearing a photograph 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Issued within the last three months • Council tax bill for the current year • UK driving licence (but only if not the name evidence) • Building Society or Credit Union book • Mortgage statement from a lender issued for the last year • Letter confirming recent house purchase or Land registry confirmation of purchase • Housing association rent card or agreement for the current year • Book or original notification letter from the Benefits Agency (but not if used as proof of address) • Revenue self-assessment/ tax demand • Register entry

Proof of identity for agents, companies and other legal persons

Where an agent makes the claim on behalf of the hirer and their principal and address of the hirer is necessary for recovery of the hire and the necessary agent will be required.

The principal will need to produce proof of name as agent. Any claim made without authority to requisition the vehicle from the hirer and address proof as described.

ADVISORY - In compliance with Birmingham City Council's 1998 regulations relating to the prevention, apprehension or detection of crime, the road traffic regulations and public safety and compliance with the Council's seizure and recovery of a vehicle on a public road, by a person who holds no valid insurance means of a recovery vehicle.
